



## Anti-Bullying Policy

"Providing safe and happy places to learn is essential to achieving school improvement, raising achievement and attendance, promoting equality and diversity, and ensuring the safety and well-being of all members of the school community."  
(DfE, 2007).

Tor Bridge High is a school in which young people flourish both academically and socially. We aim to foster a healthy and safe community that safeguards students and where individuals take responsibility for themselves and show respect for others.

### 1. Statement of Intent

Tor Bridge High is committed to ensuring that students learn in a supportive, caring and safe environment, without fear of being bullied. Bullying is anti-social behaviour and affects everyone; it is unacceptable and will not be tolerated. We are a telling school. If bullying does occur, all pupils should be able to report incidents and know that they will be dealt with swiftly. Only when all issues of bullying are addressed will students be able to fully benefit from the opportunities available at school.

### 2. Definition

Bullying is any behaviour, which is deliberately intended to hurt, threaten or frighten another person or group of people. It is repeated and usually unprovoked and can continue for a prolonged period of time. It always reflects an imbalance and abuse of power. It is important that it must not be confused with the usual childhood/teenage squabbles and arguments where individuals "fall out" with one another. This is not bullying, this is immature or poor social skills that will need addressing.

#### **Bullying can be:**

- Emotional - being unfriendly, excluding, tormenting
- Physical - pushing, kicking, hitting, punching or any use of violence
- Racist - racial taunts, graffiti, gestures.
- Sexual - unwanted physical contact or sexually abusive comments
- Homophobic - because of, or focusing on the issue of sexuality

- Verbal - name calling, sarcasm, spreading rumours, teasing
- Cyber - all areas of internet, such as email and internet chat room misuse. Mobile threats by text messaging and calls. Misuse of associated technology, i.e. camera and video facilities.
- Disability/SEN - because of, or focusing on a disability or special educational need.
- Home circumstance - targeting individuals who are looked after children or because of a particular home circumstance.

Bullying can therefore constitute any of the above activities within the context of the definition provided. Bullying may occur to anyone and this policy is inclusive of the bullying of school staff, whether by students, parents or other staff. (Members of the school workforce suffering from or concerned about bullying may also contact their trade union or professional association for support and advice).

Bullying can seriously damage a person's mental health, confidence and sense of self-worth, and they will often feel that they are at fault in some way. Students who are being bullied may show changes in behaviour, such as becoming shy and nervous, feigning illness or taking unusual absences. There may be evidence in work patterns, lacking concentration or truanting from school. These signs and symptoms may indicate other problems, but bullying should be considered a possibility and should be investigated.

### **3.0 Tor Bridge High Anti-Bullying Objectives**

To prevent, de-escalate and/or stop any continuation of harmful behaviour.

To react to bullying incidents in a reasonable, proportionate and consistent way.

To safeguard the student who has experienced bullying and to trigger sources of support.

To apply disciplinary sanctions to the student causing the bullying and ensure they learn from the experience, possibly through multi-agency support.

### **4.0 Policy Aims**

All students, parents, staff and governors should have an understanding of what bullying is.

Staff and governors should follow the school policy when bullying is reported or suspected.

All students and parents should know what bullying is and inform a member of staff if bullying arises.

Tor Bridge High will always take bullying seriously. We use a range of proactive and reactive strategies to combat and prevent bullying.

### **5.0 Reporting Procedures**

If bullying is suspected or reported, the incident will be taken seriously and dealt with as quickly as possible by the member of staff who has been approached. A clear account of the incident will be recorded and passed to the Deputy Head of School.

Deputy Heads of School will investigate the incident by interviewing all concerned and record outcomes on CPOMs.

Tutors and subject staff will be kept informed and asked to monitor the behaviour of the students concerned.

Parents/Carers will be kept informed and they are discouraged from taking matters into their own hands and should not approach a suspected student but speak to a member of staff.

Each incident of actual or alleged bullying will be unique in its representation and its level of impact on the individuals concerned. Therefore, it is important that the school is given the opportunity to tailor a strategy to address the situation and to support the bullied student according to the particular incident/s.

Students who have experienced bullying will be offered the opportunity to discuss their experience with a member of the School Office Team or another appropriate member of staff. The kinds of support they will be offered is 'Time to Talk', Kooth Online, counselling or mentoring to restore self-esteem and build confidence. Students who have bullied will be helped by; discussing what happened, discovering why the student became involved and establishing a sense of wrongdoing. Parents/carers will be informed to help change the attitude and behaviour of the student.

In agreement with both parties involved there will also be the opportunity to rebuild relationships, involving a discussion mediated by a member of staff as a way of resolving disputes.

**The following disciplinary steps may be taken:**

- Conversation to guide and advise on appropriate behaviours in social relationships.
- Official warning letter to cease offending
- Exclusion from certain areas of the school premises or certain activities
- Behaviour Support Centre for extreme behaviour
- Referral to Head of School and/or external agencies e.g. Education Welfare Officer, Police Liaison Officer.
- Fixed Term Exclusion

## **6.0 Prevention**

As a school we take bullying seriously. We use a range of proactive strategies to prevent bullying. These include;

- Effective school leadership that promotes an open and honest anti-bullying ethos.
- Use of curriculum opportunities, in particular PSHE classes where issues of diversity are discussed and anti-bullying messages are drawn out.
- Use of opportunities throughout the school calendar and at certain times of the school year to raise awareness of the negative consequences of bullying.
- Anti-Bullying Week in November of each year
- Whole school assemblies.
- Hold regular assemblies on community cohesion and other awareness raising topics
- Promote the use of appropriate language and ensure unacceptable racist, ableist, homophobic or sexist language is challenged at all times
- Pupil surveys.
- Poster campaigns.
- Improved supervision in potential problem areas
- Social Stories
- Assertiveness training.
- Review of general and specific staff induction and continuing professional development to ensure staff training reflects the anti-bullying policy and practice of the school.

## **7.0 Development, Monitoring and Review**

We plan to:

Monitor, evaluate and review our anti-bullying policy on a regular basis led by the Heads of School and reported regularly.

Support staff to identify and tackle bullying appropriately.

Ensure that students are aware that all bullying concerns will be dealt with sensitively and effectively and seek feedback from students via the Student Council and annual student questionnaires.

To learn from anti-bullying good practice in schools elsewhere and relevant statutory/voluntary organisations when appropriate.
